The Problems

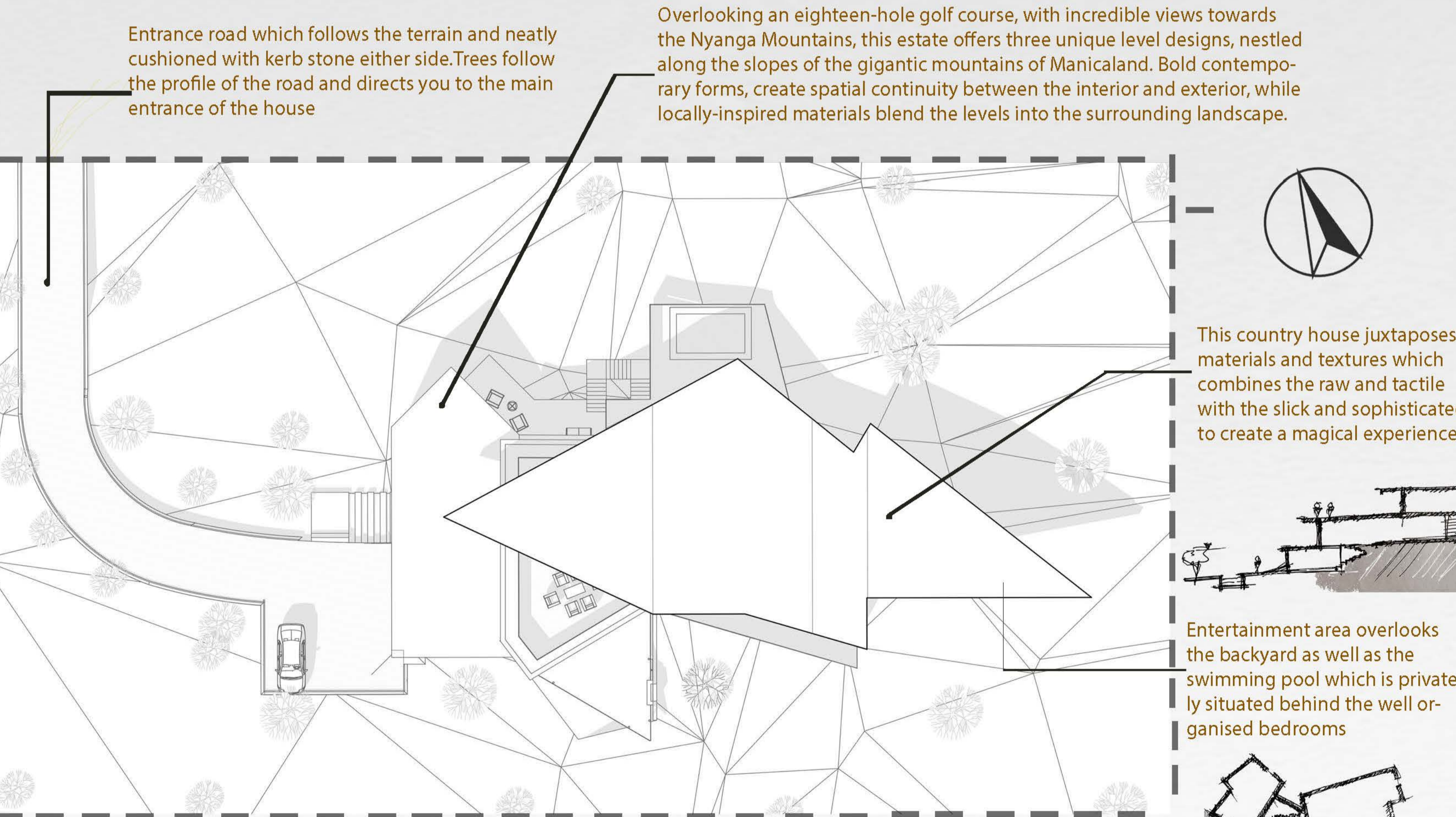
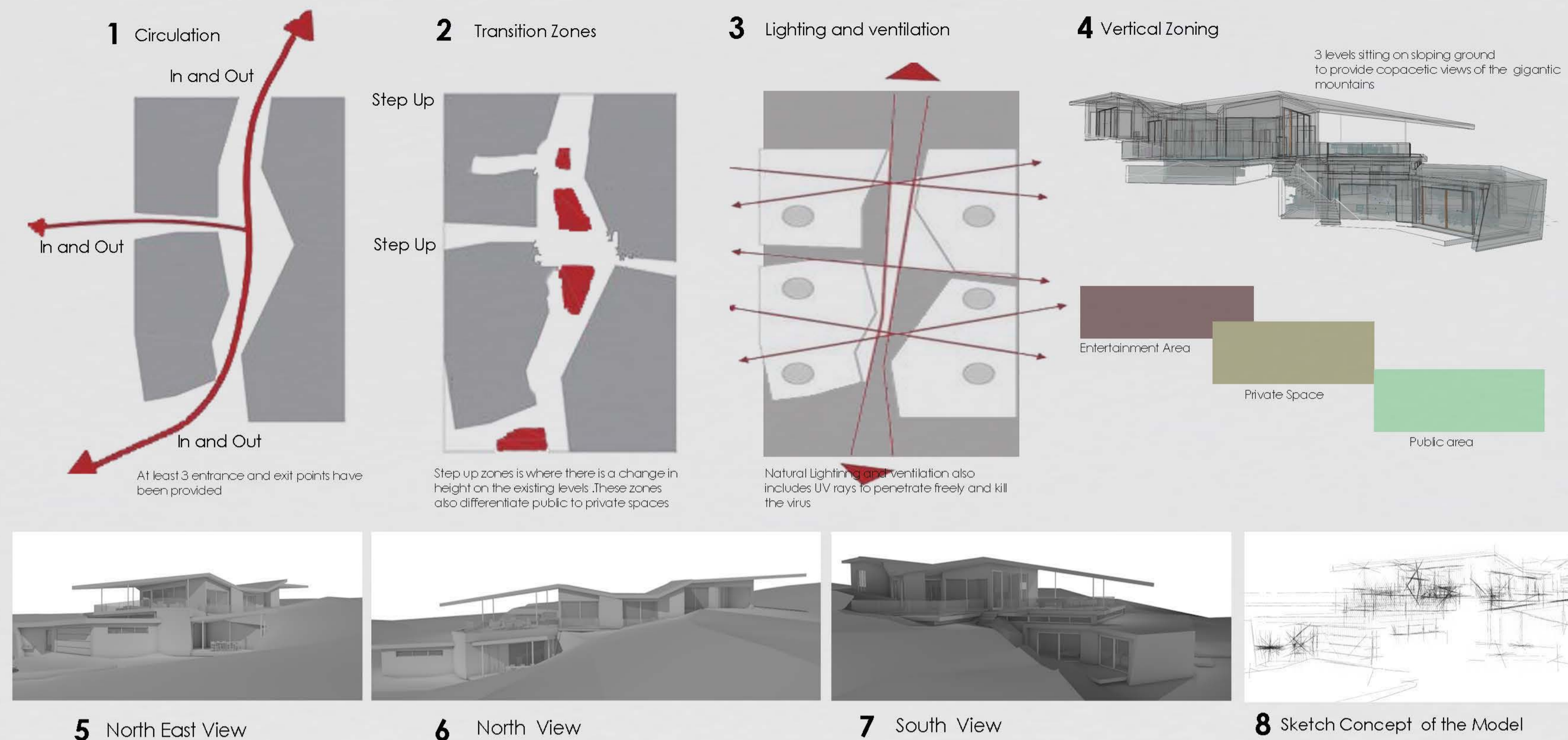

The Solutions
